Community Connections

he demands of the police are ever changing and growing. My staff work hard to ensure to keep up with the applicable law and demands of modern-day policing. However, in my experience and vital to policing is fostering community connections. Officer N. Abalan and Sergeant E. Kreimes spearheaded the 2nd First Responder Camp in August - local teens had an opportunity to participate in and hear police, fire, ambulance team scenarios, drills, exercises; additionally, Life Star landed at Salmon Brook Park where the group could ask questions, sit in the helicopter and explore. The camp not only provides a glimpse into future career opportunities, it also familiarizes the names and faces of



our police staff with our younger Granby citizens helping to break barriers and forge trust in local law enforcement.



Drug Take Back

Annually, the Granby Police Department hosts two Drug Take Back program opportunities in April and October. Two hundred eighty pounds of drugs were taken back in 2024. Public Safety Dispatchers have heard it all, from the panic of a house fire, life saving need for an ambulance, a tragedy or imminent threat.

These trained professionals remain calm under immense pressure and orchestrate services to arrive and assist emergencies of any kind. The Telecommunications office is staffed 24/7 three hundred sixty five days a year, with one Public Safety Dispatcher working per shift.

Year in Review

In 2024 GPD managed an increase in calls for service. Calls for service in general have become more complex and demanding with our limited resources. Following the 2020 pandemic, drivers' operation of motor vehicles has become more erratic throughout the state. Using grant funding GPD cracked down on motor vehicle violators in 2024 resulting in increased motor vehicle Through grant funding replacing out of date equipment was a priority for necessary upgrades, including:- a police department fire alarm system

replacement; upgraded security cameras campus installed; fencing erected behind the PD mirroring that of BOE building giving our abutting neighbors privacy. Sworn staff were rifle recertified; mandatory training classes for a new Detective completed; IBPO and UPSEU contracts negotiated; Cert Assist was brought on board keeping track of state required training. Police vehicles run 24/7this year vehicle replacement vehicles included an Explorer and Tahoe. As state requirements for law enforcement increase, the Tahoe, will provide needed space for additional equipment and evidence collection.

Through grant funding, the winter of 2024 saw improvements made at the Granby Animal Shelter located at 166 Salmon Brook Street, In addition to fresh paint, a much needed contained outdoor fenced pen was installed, rodent/pest control man-



agement and structural improvements completed. These enhancements provide a safer and more comfortable holding facility for lost/stray animals, improve security for animal and staff alike and will help maintain the facility for years to come.

Accreditation

Public Act 22-119 tasks all CT police departments to become advanced accredited. Though the Granby PD is accredited through CALEA at first tier, this public act shifted the demands to be even greater.

To meet this new challenge our accreditation manager worked hard to receive CALEA reaccreditation in 2024 and has transitioned to obtain tier three State Accreditation by January 2026.

New Team Members & Retirements
